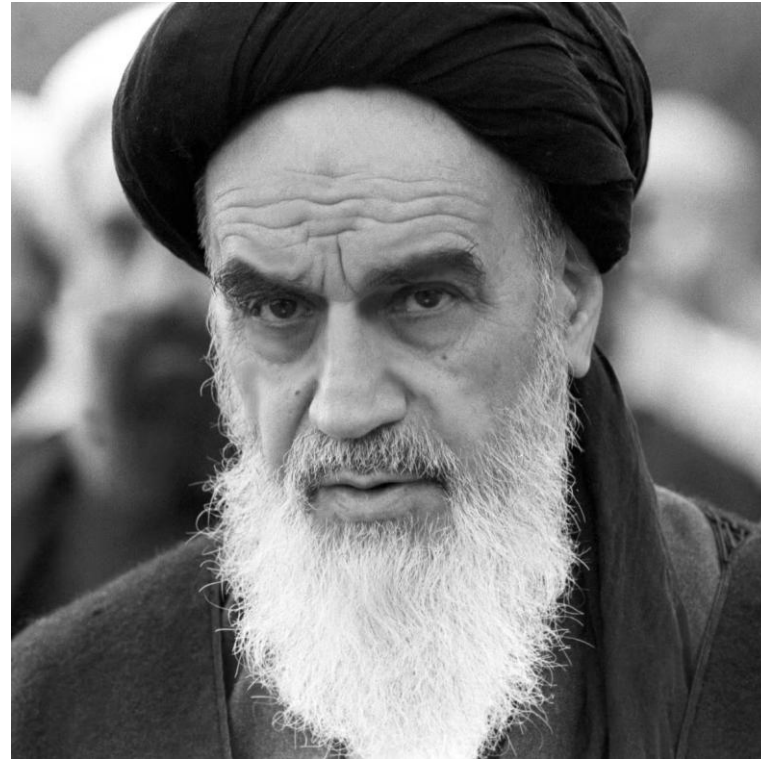

ALIVE, WELL AND FREE

Captives Taken to Algiers
and Then Germany—
Final Pact Complex

WASHINGTON, Wednesday, Jan. 22—The 52 Americans who were held hostage by Iran for 444 days were flown to West Germany, 7,000 miles, in a few hours after giving up the Presidential oath that everyone "was sworn, was sworn, and sworn."

The flight ended the ordeal which had threatened Mr. Carter for most of his last 16 months in office, and it allowed Ronald Reagan to begin his first term of the White House.

The Americans were escorted out of Iran by Algerian airplanes, aboard an Algerian airliner, and then the flight to West Germany, where they were released to their families.

Transferred to U.S. custody

The Algerian plane, carrying the 52 hostages, stopped first in Algiers to refuel. It then landed in Germany, where custody of the 52 Americans was formally transferred to the German government, a representative of the United States, then Deputy Secretary of State Francis M. Pickens, Jr., the last representative of the Carter administration, was on the plane.

Then they landed in West Germany.

Teheran Captors Call Out Insults As the 52 Leave

TEHRAN, Iran, Jan. 22—The 52 American hostages (most of them men) who were taken to Iran by Iranian captors as President Reagan was taking the Presidential oath were today being flown to West Germany.

As the Algerian jet lifted off from Mehrabad airport, ending six days of negotiations for the Americans, they could see, from a plane probably in the last hour, a tall, dark, middle-aged man in a dark suit, the Iranian Minister of the Interior, who was seen to be waving to the 52.

"There is great faith in America," said the young Islamic militants who were captors of the hostages in the last months, building them to the point of the release.

They saw the former manager of the American Embassy, Marine guards and the other hostages, who were seen to be waving to the 52. FREEZE SET ON HIRING

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 22—Ronald Reagan, Governor of California, promising "an era of national renewal," because the 40th President of the United States today as he assumes the Presidency in 12 days.
